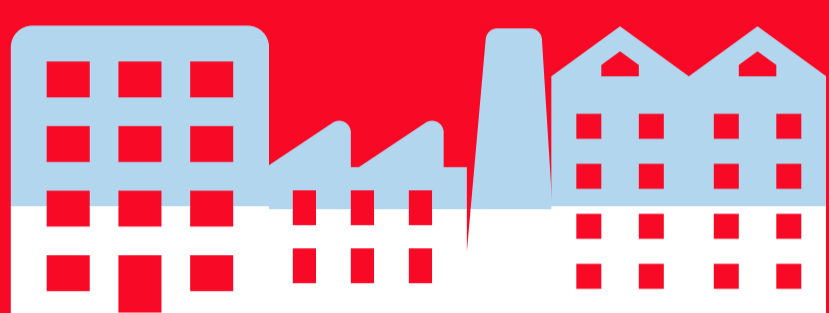
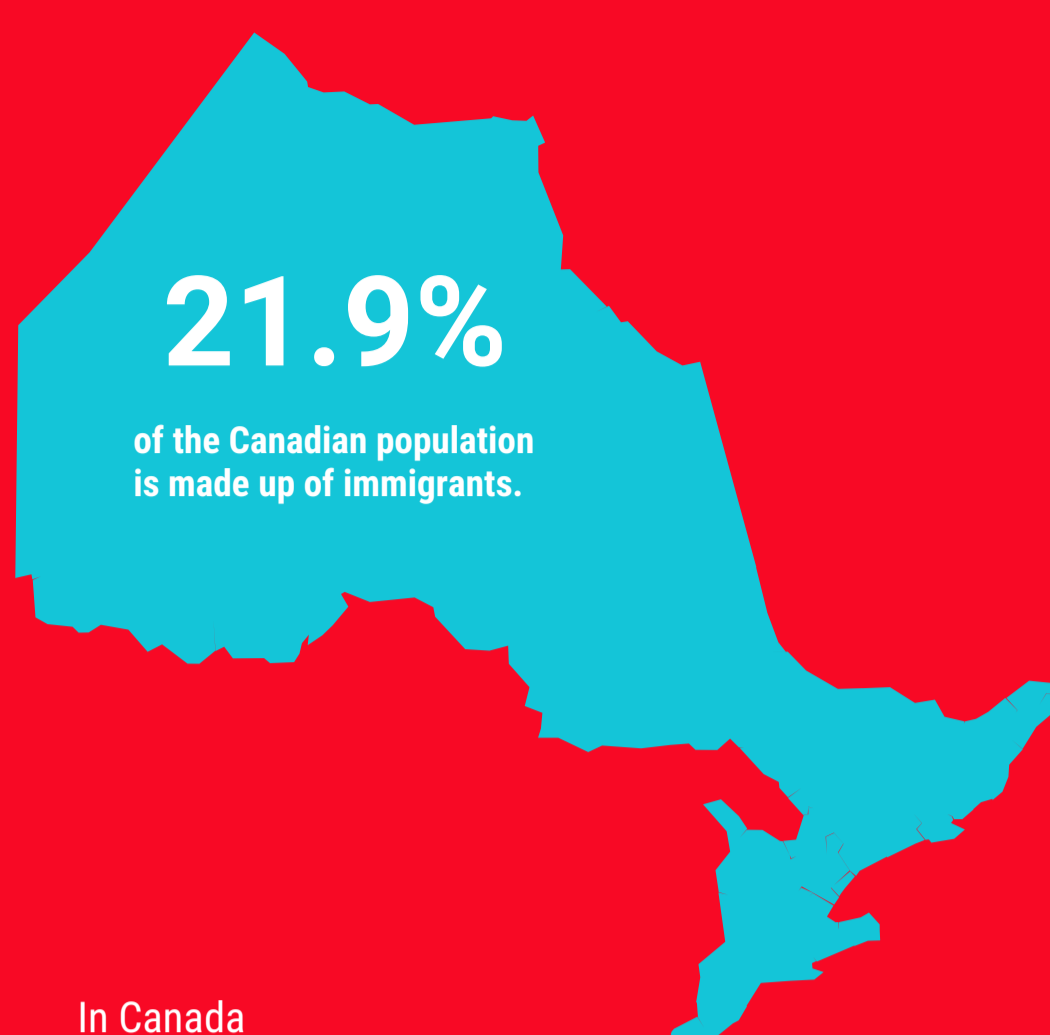

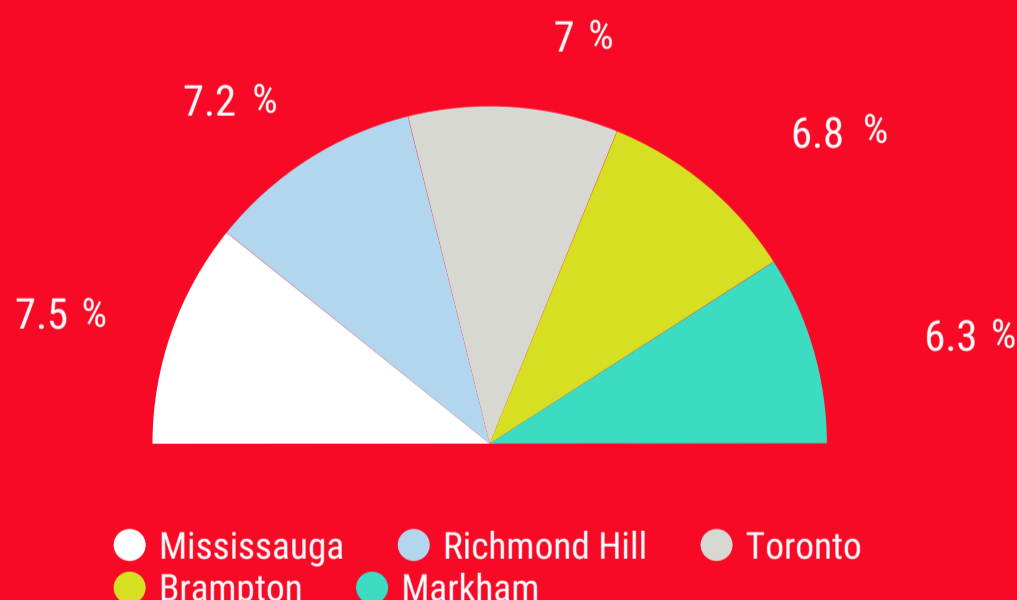
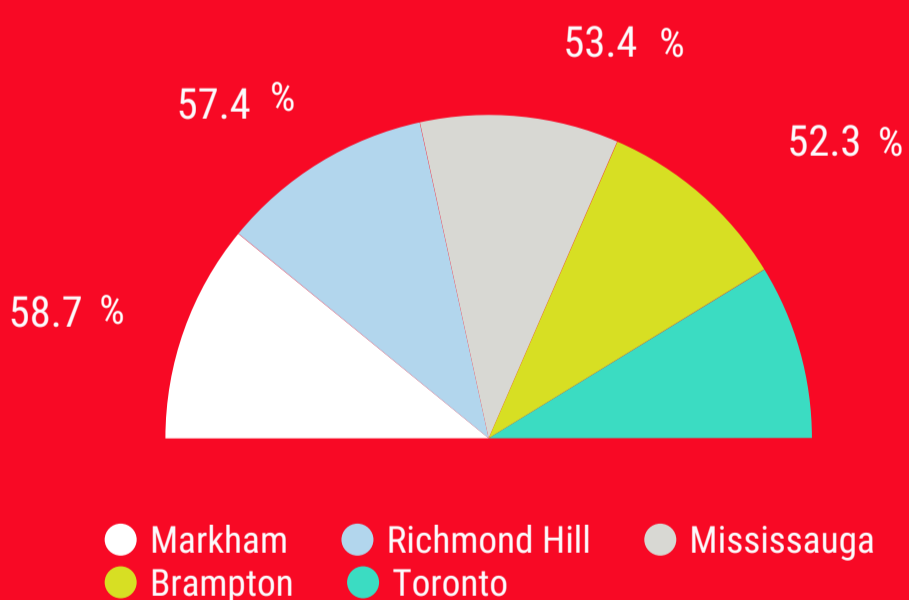

Cities in Toronto CMA, which had the highest population of RECENT immigrants

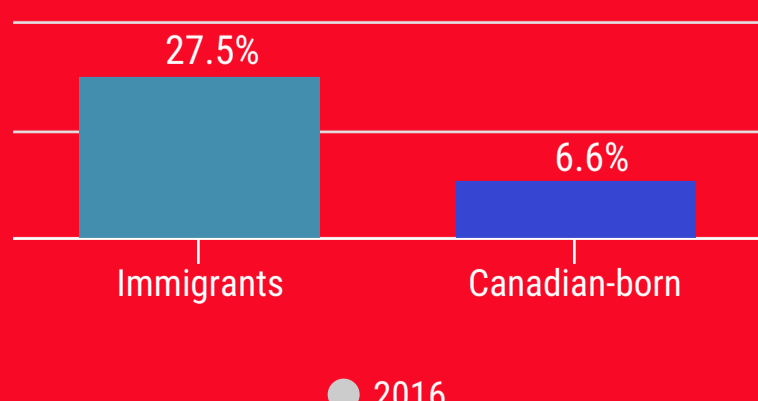

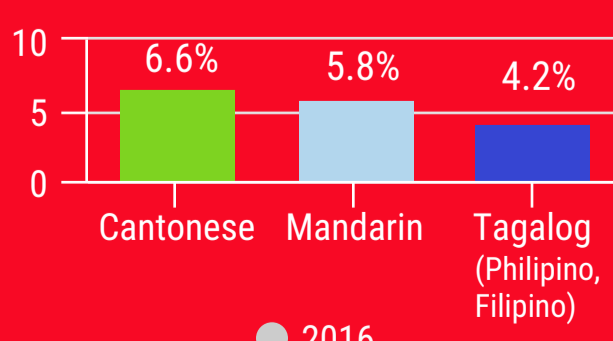
In 2016, immigrants represented 46.1% of Toronto's population, 40.8% of Vancouver's and 23.4% of Montréal's.

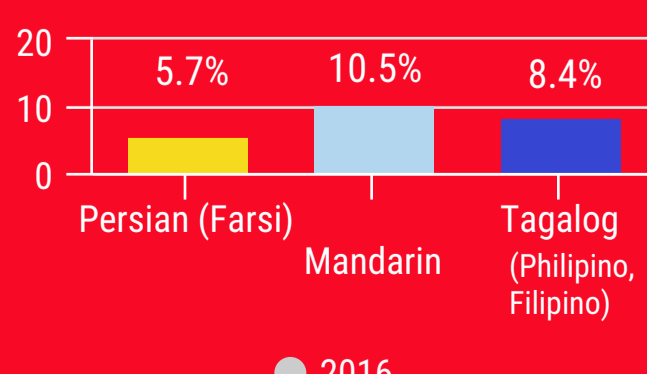
Immigrants and Canadian-born people who identified speaking more than one language
